Increased participation in after school sports since the pandemic. Increasing range of sporting opportunities offered to pupils. The school was highly represented in the Wakefield and District Inter school Junior park run competitions despite foul weather and until the COVID pandemic. The school successfully engaged Wakefield LA partners to launch an inter- school infant sports competition, now running into its third year. The school has a comprehensive PE curriculum; designed to raise fundamental basic skills and raise interest in a wide variety of sports. Expectations for progressions are detailed, clear and aligned to the National curriculum. Celebration of diversity is a core thread throughout the schools PE curriculum particularly challenging BAME inequalities and raising the profile of para- sports.
